2. The EPUB (Electronic Publication) Alternative

Foundry VTT Module

Foundry Virtual Tabletop also sells an official *Candlekeep Mysteries* module. It offers deeper automation, such as pre-built macros, sound effects integration, and highly customizable scene management. The file type is a .module file that you install into your Foundry data directory. Fantasy Grounds Module

Fantasy Grounds distributors (like SmiteWorks) provide a module for their Unity platform. How to Choose the Right File Type for Your Campaign

Use a PDF Reader with Side-by-Side View

Tools like Adobe Acrobat, Foxit Reader, or **PDF Expert** allow you to view two pages side-by-side. This is invaluable when a description spans multiple pages. For the **Candlekeep Mysteries file type** PDF, set the view to "Two Pages" or "Continuous" scroll depending on your preference.

Leverage Hyperlinks in the PDF
