Step 1: Clean the Surface Thoroughly

Rinse thoroughly with clean water and dry completely with a clean microfiber cloth. Step 2: Remove Stubborn Stains and Baked-On Residue

- **Baking Soda Paste:** Make a thick paste with baking soda and a small amount of water. Apply it to the stain and let it sit for 5-10 minutes. Gently scrub with a soft cloth or a non-abrasive sponge, following the grain (if brushed). Rinse and dry.

Use it with a fine cutting compound, then a finishing polish.

Step 4: Remove all Polish Residue

Any remaining polish residue will attract dust and look dull. After buffing, go over the entire area with a dry, clean microfiber cloth to pick up any last traces of the product. For a truly streak-free finish, you can use a slightly damp cloth (with water or a 50/50 water and vinegar solution) and then dry immediately.

Step 5: Apply a Protective Final Touch

For long-lasting results, you can apply a thin layer of mineral oil, baby oil, or a dedicated stainless steel protectant. Place a few drops on a clean cloth and wipe it over the polished surface in the direction of the grain (for brushed) or in a thin, even coat (for mirror). This helps to fill in microscopic pores, repel water, and reduce the appearance of fingerprints. Buff gently with a clean cloth to remove any excess oil.

Olive Oil and Vinegar Method

The vinegar cleans and degreases, while the olive oil leaves behind a gentle shine and protective layer. Buff with a dry cloth to remove excess oil. Flour and Baking Soda Polish

For a deeper clean that also polishes, make a paste of two parts baking soda and one part water. Apply it to the surface and let it dry completely. Once dry, wipe it off with a damp cloth. 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sponges are too harsh. Use only non-abrasive sponges, soft cloths, or dedicated stainless steel cleaning pads.

- **Polishing Across the Grain:** This is the most common mistake on brushed stainless steel. It creates visible cross-hatch scratches that are very difficult to remove. Always polish **with the grain**.
- **Using Too Much Product:** Excess polish can be difficult to remove, leaving a sticky, residue-filled surface that attracts dust. A little goes a long way.

- **Skipping the Initial Cleaning:** Polishing a dirty surface grinds dirt and grit into the steel. Always clean first.
