- **The Uffizi Gallery:** One of the world's greatest art museums, located between Piazza della Signoria and the Arno River. Its long, colonnaded U-shape is distinctive on a map.
- **Basilica of Santa Croce:** Located to the east, this Franciscan church is the burial place of Michelangelo, Galileo, and Machiavelli.
- **Basilica of Santa Maria Novella:** Located near the train station, this Dominican church has a striking green and white marble facade.

Navigating the Historic Districts: A Guide to Florence's Neighborhoods

Santa Croce (The East)

Distinguished by the vast piazza in front the basilica, this district has a more laid-back, local feel. It is known for its artisan workshops, leather schools, and traditional trattorias. Santa Maria Novella (The West)

Santo Spirito / Oltrarno (South of the River)

Literally meaning "the other side of the Arno," this is the bohemian and artisan heart of Florence. Crossing the Ponte Vecchio or the Ponte Santa Trinità takes you into a different world. The **map of Florence Italy city center** will show the vast Pitti Palace and the sprawling Boboli Gardens here. This district is famous for its authentic nightlife, craft workshops, and excellent local restaurants. Navigating the Oltrarno requires a good map, as the streets are less predictable than those in the city center.

The Arno River: A Natural Guide Through the City Center
