5. **Bear Crawls (40 seconds work, 20 seconds rest):** Walk on hands and feet, belly facing the floor, moving forward and backward. Great for core strength.
6. **Mountain Climbers (40 seconds work, 20 seconds rest):** In plank position, alternate bringing knees to chest. For beginners, slow the pace.
7. **Cool-Down (1 minute):** Stand tall, take deep breaths. Stretch arms up high, then fold forward and hang for 10 seconds. Roll up slowly. Shake out arms and legs.

This complete 10 minute workout for kids covers cardiovascular, strength, and flexibility elements. Feel free to swap exercises—for example, replace mountain climbers with “bunny hops” (small jumps forward and backward). The key is to keep the child laughing and moving.
