While the owner's manual may reference a "normal" and "severe" driving schedule, it is generally recommended that all drivers follow the severe schedule, as most daily driving involves stop-and-go traffic, short trips, or extreme temperatures, all of which qualify as severe conditions.

Oil and Filter Change

The single most important routine service for your 2007 Camry is the engine oil and filter change. Clean oil lubricates the engine's moving parts, reduces friction, dissipates heat, and helps keep the engine clean by suspending contaminants. Toyota recommends using 5W-30 conventional or synthetic blend oil for most climates, though some owners prefer full synthetic for extended protection. At every 5,000-mile interval, your oil and filter should be replaced. This simple service is the best defense against engine wear and sludge buildup.

Tire Rotation and Pressure Check

Rotating your tires every 5,000 miles ensures even tread wear across all four tires. This extends the life of your tires and maintains consistent handling and traction. During this service, a technician should also check and adjust tire pressure to the manufacturer's recommended levels, typically found on a sticker inside the driver's door jamb. Proper tire inflation improves fuel economy, ride comfort, and tire longevity. For the 2007 Camry, the standard tire size is 215/60R16 on most trims, and maintaining correct pressure is essential for safety and performance.

Visual Inspection of Fluids and Belts

Every 5,000 miles provides an excellent opportunity for a thorough visual inspection. A qualified technician should check the levels and condition of your coolant, brake fluid, transmission fluid, power steering fluid, and windshield washer fluid. Additionally, the drive belts (serpentine belt) and hoses should be examined for cracks, fraying, or signs of leakage. Catching a worn belt or a slow

fluid leak early can prevent a breakdown on the highway and save you from more extensive repairs.

The 15,000-Mile and 30,000-Mile Services

The 15,000-mile and 30,000-mile intervals include all the previous 5,000-mile services plus additional inspections and replacements. These milestones are designed to address components that wear at a slower rate than oil and filters.

Engine Air Filter Replacement

Your engine air filter prevents dirt, dust, and debris from entering the engine's combustion chamber. A clogged air filter restricts airflow, reducing engine performance and fuel economy. For the 2007 Camry, the engine air filter should be inspected at every 15,000 miles and replaced as needed, typically every 30,000 miles. If you drive in dusty or polluted environments, more frequent replacements may be necessary. Replacing the air filter is a simple and inexpensive service that has a direct impact on your engine's breathing efficiency.

Cabin Air Filter Replacement

The cabin air filter cleans the air that enters the passenger compartment through the heating and air conditioning system. Over time, this filter accumulates pollen, dust, mold spores, and other allergens. A dirty cabin air filter can reduce HVAC airflow and produce unpleasant odors. For the 2007 Camry, the cabin air filter is located behind the glove box and should be replaced every 15,000 to 30,000 miles. This is an easy DIY task that significantly improves the comfort and air

quality inside your vehicle.

Brake System Inspection

At the 30,000-mile service, a comprehensive brake inspection is critical. This includes checking the thickness of the front and rear brake pads, inspecting the rotors for scoring or warping, and examining the brake lines and calipers for leaks. The 2007 Camry is known for having durable brakes, but aggressive driving or heavy loads can accelerate wear. Replacing brake pads before they wear down to the metal prevents damage to the rotors and ensures stopping power remains reliable.

The Major Service Interval: 60,000 Miles and 90,000 Miles

These intervals represent the most significant and costly maintenance events in the life of your 2007 Camry. Properly addressing these services is what separates a high-mileage survivor from a neglected vehicle. While the costs may seem high upfront, they are a fraction of the cost of major repairs that would result from deferred maintenance.

Spark Plug Replacement (60,000 Miles)

The 2007 Camry is equipped with iridium-tipped spark plugs that are designed to last for 60,000 miles. These plugs provide a strong, consistent spark that optimizes fuel combustion. Worn spark plugs can cause misfires, rough idling, reduced fuel economy, and difficulty starting. Replacing them at 60,000 miles restores engine performance and efficiency. On the 2.4L four-cylinder engine, this job is relatively straightforward, while the 3.5L V6 requires a bit more effort due to the rear bank of cylinders being harder to access.

Transmission Fluid Service

Transmission fluid is the lifeblood of your automatic transmission. It lubricates, cools, and provides hydraulic pressure for gear changes. For the 2007 Camry, Toyota recommends inspecting the automatic transmission fluid at 60,000 miles and replacing it if the vehicle is used for towing, frequent stop-and-go driving, or in mountainous terrain. Many experienced mechanics recommend a full drain and fill (not a power flush) at 60,000 miles as a proactive measure. Using genuine Toyota WS (World Standard) transmission fluid is critical for proper operation. Neglecting the transmission fluid can lead to harsh shifting, slipping, and eventual transmission failure.

Coolant Flush and Replacement (90,000 Miles)

Engine coolant, or antifreeze, does more than just prevent freezing. It also raises the boiling point of the coolant, protects against corrosion, and lubricates the water pump. Over time, the additives in the coolant break down, becoming acidic and corrosive. For the 2007 Camry, Toyota recommends replacing the engine coolant at 90,000 miles. This service involves draining the old coolant, flushing the system with clean water or a chemical flush, and refilling with the proper 50/50 mixture of Toyota Super Long Life Coolant (SLLC) and distilled water. Skipping this service can lead to a failed water pump, radiator corrosion, or a clogged heater core.

Timing Belt Inspection (V6 Models) and Water Pump Consideration

This is a critical distinction for owners of the 2007 Camry. The 2.4L four-cylinder engine uses a timing chain, which does not

require periodic replacement. However, the 3.5L V6 engine uses a timing belt, which is a rubber belt that synchronizes the rotation of the crankshaft and camshaft. Toyota recommends inspecting the timing belt at 60,000 miles and replacing it at 90,000 miles. If the timing belt fails, the engine will stop immediately and may suffer catastrophic internal damage due to piston-to-valve contact.

Most experienced technicians strongly recommend replacing the water pump at the same time as the timing belt. The water pump is driven by the timing belt and has a similar lifespan. Replacing both components together saves on labor costs because the same labor-intensive process is required to access both parts. Installing a new water pump provides peace of mind and eliminates the risk of a costly failure shortly after the timing belt service.

Additional Maintenance Items and Inspections

Beyond the major intervals, there are several other components on the 2007 Camry that require periodic attention. Including these in your scheduled maintenance guide ensures comprehensive coverage of the vehicle's systems.

Drive Belt (Serpentine Belt) Replacement

The serpentine belt drives the alternator, power steering pump, air conditioning compressor, and sometimes the water pump on certain engines. For the 2007 Camry, the serpentine belt should be inspected at every oil change and replaced at around 60,000 to 90,000 miles. Signs of a failing belt include squealing noises, visible cracks on the ribs, or glazing on the belt surface. A broken serpentine belt will quickly drain the battery and cause the

engine to overheat, leaving you stranded.

Battery and Charging System Test

Automotive batteries typically last three to five years. At each scheduled maintenance interval, a technician should test your battery's state of charge and cold cranking amps (CCA). Suspension and Steering Components
