The Seven Major Chakras

- **Vishuddhi (Throat Chakra):** Situated at the throat. It relates to communication, truth, and self-expression.
- **Ajna (Third Eye Chakra):** Located between the eyebrows. It is the center of intuition, wisdom, and perception beyond the physical senses.
- **Sahasrara (Crown Chakra):** At the very top of the head. It represents pure consciousness, enlightenment, and the ultimate union with the divine.

The Three Main Nadis

If the chakras are the cities on the journey, the nadis are the roads. These are subtle energy channels through which prana (life force) and Kundalini flow. While there are said to be 72,000 nadis, three are of paramount importance in **Kundalini Tantra**.

1. **Ida Nadi:** The left channel, associated with the moon, coolness, and the feminine, receptive aspect. It governs our mental and emotional nature.
2. **Pingala Nadi:** The right channel, associated with the sun, heat, and the masculine, dynamic aspect. It governs our physical and vital energy.
3. **Sushumna Nadi:** The central channel, which runs along the spinal column. The goal of **Kundalini Tantra** is to draw the Kundalini energy from the base of the spine into the Sushumna nadi, allowing it to rise directly to the crown chakra. When the energy flows in the Ida and Pingala, we are caught in the world of duality. When it enters the Sushumna, we move toward unity.

Core Practices in Kundalini Tantra

Kundalini Tantra is not a passive belief system but an active practice. It requires discipline, dedication, and often, guidance from a qualified teacher (Guru). The techniques are powerful and designed to systematically purify the body and mind, making them suitable vessels for the immense energy of the awakened Kundalini.

Asana and Pranayama: Preparing the Vessel

The physical dimension of the practice is not about fitness; it is about preparing the body for the intense energetic shifts. **Asanas** (yogic postures) are used to strengthen the body, make the spine flexible, and open the energy channels. Specific postures target different chakras and nadis.

Pranayama (breath control) is even more vital. Breath is the bridge between the physical and the subtle. The **Maha Mrityunjaya Mantra** and the **Gayatri Mantra** are other powerful, widely used mantras in this tradition for purification and healing.

Yantra is the visual equivalent of a mantra. These are geometric designs, with the **Shri Yantra** being the most famous, that represent the cosmic structure. Meditating on a yantra is a way to focus the mind and attune to the specific energy pattern it embodies.

Meditation and Kriya: The Inner Journey

One might meditate on the image of the Kundalini serpent, on the light at a specific chakra, or on the sensation of energy moving up the spine.
