When the wind blows, the cans will clank together. This is a perfect outdoor craft that teaches them about sound and balance.

Plastic Bottle Planters

This is a wonderful way to introduce a touch of nature into the home. Cut a 2-liter plastic bottle in half. The bottom half becomes the planter. The child can decorate the outside with paint, googly eyes, and pipe cleaners to turn it into a caterpillar or a monster. Fill it with potting soil and a small succulent or seed.
