Hyper-V Replica

Hyper-V Replica allowed asynchronous replication of virtual machines to a secondary site, enabling disaster recovery without expensive SAN replication. The initial synchronization could be done over a network or by shipping an external drive, making it flexible for various bandwidth scenarios.

Migration and Upgrade Paths

As Windows Server 2012 reached end of support in October 2023, organizations must consider their next steps. However, if you are still running it, understanding migration paths is crucial.

In-Place Upgrade vs. Migration
