Step 2: The First Bead

Step 3: The Next Three Beads

On the next three beads, pray the **Hail Mary** for an increase in the virtues of faith, hope, and charity. Traditionally, these three Hail Marys are offered for these intentions. After each Hail Mary, you may quietly add the intention in your heart.

Step 4: The Glory Be and the Fatima Prayer

After the three Hail Marys, you will come to a small chain or space. Here, pray the **Glory Be**: "Glory be to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit. As it was in the beginning, is now, and ever shall be, world without end. Amen." Many people also add the **Fatima Prayer** at this point: "O my Jesus, forgive us our sins, save us from the fires of hell, lead all souls to heaven, especially those in most need of Thy mercy."

Step 5: Announce the First Mystery

Now you are ready for the first decade. Announce the mystery you will be meditating on. For example, if you are praying the Joyful Mysteries on a Monday or Saturday, you would say: "The First Joyful Mystery: The Annunciation." At this moment, take a brief pause to imagine the scene. Visualize the angel Gabriel appearing to Mary. Consider her humility, her trust, and her "yes" to God. Then pray the **Our Father** on the large bead.

Step 6: The Ten Beads of the Decade

On each of the next ten small beads, pray a **Hail Mary**. As your fingers move from bead to bead, let your mind remain with the mystery you have announced. Do not worry if your thoughts wander; gently bring them back to the scene. The ten Hail Marys are like a rhythmic background that keeps your body engaged while your soul contemplates.

Step 7: The Glory Be and the Fatima Prayer

After the tenth Hail Mary, pray the **Glory Be** and again the **Fatima Prayer**. This completes one decade.

Step 8: Repeat for the Remaining Four Decades

For each of the next four decades, you will repeat the pattern: announce the mystery, pause to reflect, pray the Our Father, pray ten Hail Marys, and conclude with the Glory Be and Fatima Prayer. The full Rosary thus contains five decades, each dedicated to one mystery from the set you have chosen.

Step 9: Conclude the Rosary

After you have completed the fifth decade, pray the **Hail Holy Queen** (Salve Regina) as a final act of devotion. Then make the Sign of the Cross. Many people also add a concluding prayer for the intentions of the Pope or for specific personal intentions. You have now completed the Rosary.

The Four Sets of Mysteries and When to Pray Them

- **Luminous Mysteries** (Thursday): The Baptism of Jesus in the Jordan, The Wedding at Cana, The Proclamation of the Kingdom, The Transfiguration, The Institution of the Eucharist.
