- **Carbohydrates:** 45% of total calories. This is about 292 grams of carbs. Do not skip them.
- **Fats:** 25% of total calories. This works out to about 72 grams of fat.

This breakdown ensures you have enough protein for repair, enough carbs for energy and muscle glycogen, and enough fats for hormonal health. This is the foundational macro split for an effective **mass building diet for skinny guys**.

Sample Meal Plan for a Skinny Guy (2,600 Calories)

Timing Your Meals for Maximum Muscle Growth
