1. Using Too Much Detergent

This is by far the most common cause. High-efficiency (HE) washers, including Samsung’s Eco Bubble models, require far less detergent than traditional machines. When you add too much detergent—or use a non-HE formula—the excess soap creates a thick foam that the machine cannot rinse away effectively. The Sud error then appears to halt the cycle before the foam spills out of the door or clogs the drain.

2. Using the Wrong Type of Detergent

Not all laundry detergents are created equal. If you are using a standard detergent meant for top-loading agitator machines, it will likely produce too many suds in a front-loading Samsung Eco Bubble washer. Always look for the “HE” (High Efficiency) label on your detergent bottle. Additionally, some liquid detergents are more concentrated than powder, and using too much liquid can also lead to excessive foam.

3. Overloading the Machine

When you stuff too many clothes into the drum, there is less room for water to circulate. This restricts the rinsing process and traps detergent in the fabric folds. Alternatively, you can pour a cup of white vinegar into the detergent drawer. Vinegar neutralizes the alkalinity of soap and reduces suds without harming your clothes or the machine.

Step 4: Run a Rinse-Only Cycle

After you have removed the visible suds, close the door and run a “Rinse+Spin” cycle with no detergent. This will flush out any remaining soap residue from the drum and the hose. You may need to run this cycle twice if the foam was particularly heavy.

Step 5: Clean the Detergent Drawer and Filter

Remove the detergent drawer and wash it thoroughly under hot running water. Soap residue often accumulates in the drawer compartment over time, leading to future Sud errors. Next, locate the drain pump filter (usually at the front bottom panel of the machine). Place a towel under it, unscrew the filter cap, and remove any lint, coins, or debris. Clean the filter completely, reseal it, and run a test cycle.

Step 6: Check the Drain Hose

Inspect the drain hose for kinks, bends, or blockages. If the hose is crushed against the wall or trapped under the machine, water cannot flow out freely. Straighten the hose and ensure it drains into a standpipe or sink at the correct height—typically 60–90 cm above the floor.

Step 7: Reset the Machine

After completing the above steps, unplug the washing machine for 5–10 minutes. This resets the electronic control board and clears any temporary error logs. Plug it back in, run a short wash cycle (with no clothes and no detergent), and verify that the error code has disappeared.

Use the Correct Amount of HE Detergent

Check the Drain Filter Monthly

Make it a habit to inspect the drain pump filter at least once a month. Remove any debris even if you do not see an error code. This small step can prevent a host of drainage and suds-related problems.

Use the Eco Bubble Setting Wisely

Samsung’s Eco Bubble technology mixes air, water, and detergent before the cycle starts. This pre-mixing can generate more foam than a normal wash. If you frequently get the Sud error, try using the “Quick Wash” or “Cotton” cycle instead, or reduce your detergent amount by half when using the Eco Bubble function.
