Tips for Playing Star Wars Music on Trumpet

Focus on Articulation

Practice tonguing on a single note before attempting the melodies. Use a metronome to ensure your rhythms are crisp and precise.

Develop Your Upper Register

The Importance of Dynamics and Musical Expression
