

# The Hobbit Film Series Cast

### Ken Stott as Balin

Ken Stott portrayed Balin, the wise and gentle elder of the company. As Thorin's most trusted adviser, Balin served as the group's moral compass. **William Kircher as Bifur, James Nesbitt as Bofur, and Stephen Hunter as Bombur**

The trio of Bifur, Bofur, and Bombur provided much of the comic relief within the **Hobbit film series cast**. William Kircher played Bifur, whose distinctive feature was an axe embedded in his head, limiting his speech to Khuzdul. James Nesbitt portrayed Bofur, the cheerful and good-natured toymaker who became one of Bilbo's closest friends in the company. Stephen Hunter played Bombur, the famously rotund dwarf whose appetite provided many humorous moments.

Nesbitt's performance in particular added genuine pathos to the **Hobbit film series cast**. Ryan Gage played Alfrid, the Master's sycophantic aide, providing additional comic relief and moral contrast within Lake-town.

Luke Evans was a notable addition to the **Hobbit film series cast** as Bard the Bowman. Evans brought rugged charisma and quiet heroism to the role. Bard is the reluctant leader of Lake-town's people, and Evans captured his weariness, his sense of duty, and his hidden strength.
