The dropout rate hovers around 70 to 80 percent. Those who survive earn the right to wear the distinctive trident and join a squadron, but the real training has only just begun.

Training: Forging the Elite

Advanced Tactical Training

Once selected, new members enter a continuous cycle of training that never truly ends. DEVGRU operators train for months on specific mission profiles, such as close-quarters battle (CQB), airborne operations (including HALO/HAHO jumps), and maritime interdiction. Each operator becomes a specialist in at least one skill—breaching, sniper, medic, or communications—while maintaining proficiency in all core competencies.

High-Repetition Drills

A secret that sets SEAL Team 6 apart is its obsession with repetition. An operator might practice a single room-clearing sequence hundreds of times until it becomes muscle memory. This allows them to execute complex maneuvers in total darkness or under fire without conscious thought. They use "simunition" (non-lethal training rounds) and force-on-force exercises that replicate the chaos of real combat.

Interdisciplinary Training

DEVGRU frequently trains alongside other elite units, such as the Army's Delta Force, the CIA's Special Activities Division, and foreign counterparts like the British SAS. These joint exercises expose operators to different tactics and technologies, fostering a culture of continuous improvement. The sharing of best practices is one of the less-publicized secrets that keeps the unit ahead of evolving threats.

Operational Secrecy and Famous Missions

- **Hostage rescues in Afghanistan and Iraq:** Numerous classified operations have freed Western hostages, though most details remain classified.

The Equipment and Technology
