You should have a square with a closed bottom point and open flaps at the top.

Step 4: Form the Petal Folds

With the closed point pointing away from you, lift the top right flap and fold it toward the center line. Repeat with the top left flap. Flip the paper over and do the same on the other side. You will have a kite-like shape.

Step 5: Fold the Top Layers Down

Now, take the top point of the front layer and fold it downward, aligning the tip with the bottom edge of the model. Crease well. Repeat on the other side. This creates the petal shapes.

Step 6: Open and Shape the Petals

Turn the model so the closed point is at the top. Curl each of the four triangular flaps outward gently. You can use a pencil or your finger to give them a natural curve. To open the flower completely, blow into the small hole at the bottom (this works if your paper is thin) or carefully push the base open with a finger. The petals will spread like a lily. If you wish, you can add a stem by folding green paper into a narrow tube and inserting it into the base. Congratulations—you have completed your first origami paper flower step by step.
