Zara Tindall, at number nineteen, is followed by her three daughters, Mia Tindall, Lena Tindall, and Lucas Tindall, who occupy positions twenty-two through twenty-four.

The Descendants of Princess Margaret

The line of succession to the British throne full list extends beyond the descendants of Queen Elizabeth II to include the children and grandchildren of her late sister, Princess Margaret, Countess of Snowdon. Princess Margaret's son, David Armstrong-Jones, 2nd Earl of Snowdon, is twenty-fifth in line. His son, Charles Armstrong-Jones, Viscount Linley, is twenty-sixth, followed by his daughter, Lady Margarita Armstrong-Jones, at number twenty-seven.

Princess Margaret's daughter, Lady Sarah Chatto, holds the twenty-eighth position. Her two sons, Samuel Chatto and Arthur Chatto, are twenty-ninth and thirtieth in line respectively. This branch of the family, while not performing official royal duties, remains an integral part of the extended royal lineage.
