Stern captured her laughing, posing, and engaging with the lens in a way that felt both calculated and spontaneous. These images are among the most reproduced in the series, showcasing Monroe at her most glamorous, but also hinting at the

exhaustion that comes from constant performance.

Day Two: From Playful to Poignant

By the second day, Monroe appeared more relaxed and willing to experiment. She shed the heavy gowns for simpler attire — a white turtleneck, a sheer scarf, and eventually almost nothing at all. It was during this day that Stern captured the famous "nudes" that would later cause controversy. When Stern eventually processed the negatives, he produced a total of 2,571 images, each one a distinct moment frozen in time. The complete set was first published in a limited-edition book in 1982, titled *Marilyn Monroe: The Complete Last Sitting*. The collection includes:

- **Portraits in black velvet and diamond jewelry** — the iconic "Vogue" looks that defined the shoot's public face.
- **Casual shots in a white sweater and jeans** — Monroe off-duty, relaxed and approachable.
- **Semi-nude and nude studies** — artistic and tasteful, yet bold for their time.
- **Outdoor photographs on the hotel balcony** — bathed in California sunlight.
- **Bedroom scenes with Monroe holding a book or a glass of champagne** — intimate and melancholic.

Each category contributes to the narrative arc of the session — from professional glamour to personal vulnerability. The breadth of the collection allows viewers to trace Monroe's emotional state in real time, making it an invaluable document for biographers and fans alike.

The Cultural and Artistic Significance

Marilyn Monroe The Complete Last Sitting is more than just a photo shoot; it is a cultural artifact that captures the final chapter of a legend. The images have been exhibited in galleries worldwide, reproduced in countless books, and analyzed by scholars in film studies, photography, and gender studies. Bert Stern's approach — minimal interference, candid moments, and a focus on raw emotion — anticipated the style of celebrity portraiture that would dominate later decades. This authenticity is why the images continue to resonate — they do not hide the pain beneath the glamour.

The Controversy Over the "Last Sitting"

Notably, the term "last sitting" is technically accurate but slightly misleading. While these were the last professional photographs Monroe ever sat for, she did have other informal snapshots taken shortly before her death. However, the magnitude and artistry of Stern's work have cemented "Last Sitting" as the definitive final portrait of Monroe. The name itself has become synonymous with the end of an era — a bittersweet farewell to Hollywood's golden age.

Collecting and Preserving The Complete Last Sitting

Over the decades, the prints and negatives from this series have become highly sought-after by collectors. Original prints signed by Bert Stern command top prices at auction. The complete set of 2,571 images was purchased by a private collector in 2005 for an undisclosed sum, though portions of the collection have been digitized and are available through the Bert Stern Estate. Museums such as the Museum of Modern Art (MoMA) in New York and the Getty Museum in Los Angeles have exhibited selected images.

by Taschen. Online archives also offer a curated selection, but nothing compares to the experience of flipping through the pages of a large-format book that preserves the richness of Stern's film-based photography.
