Please see one of our greeters at the back if you need help finding these rooms."

A Closing Invitation

"Before we continue with our service, I want to extend a special invitation. If you are looking for a church home or simply want to learn more about the hope that we have in Jesus, please fill out the connection card in your pew. We would love to connect with you without any pressure. Today, may we all be refreshed by the presence of the Holy Spirit as we worship the King of Kings."

Adapting the Welcome for Different SDA Church Contexts
