Season 1 (2011–2012): The Beginning of a Legend

The first season of **Grimm** introduced viewers to Portland homicide detective Nick Burkhardt, played by David Giuntoli, who learns he is a descendant of the Grimms—hunters who can see the true monstrous forms of Wesen. The season premiered on **October 28, 2011**, with the episode "Pilot," and concluded on **May 18, 2012**, after 22 episodes.

Notable episodes and their original airdates include:

- **"Pilot"** – October 28, 2011: The series premiere establishes Nick's

awakening and his first encounters with Monroe, a reformed Blutbad.

- **"Bears Will Be Bears"** – November 11, 2011: A clever take on "Goldilocks and the Three Bears," introducing the Jägerbar Wesen.

Season 1 established the core formula: for every "Wesen of the week" story, a broader mythology involving the Royal Families, the keys, and the ancient war between Grimms and Wesen slowly emerged. The air dates of this season show a fall launch with a midseason break typical of network television, allowing the show to build momentum.

Season 2 (2012–2013): Deepening the Mythology

Season 2 premiered on **August 13, 2012**—an unusually early summer start—and ran until **May 21, 2013**, also spanning 22 episodes. This season is beloved for its darker tone and the introduction of the villainous Captain Renard's backstory, as well as the rise of the Resistance.

Key episodes include:

- **"Bad Teeth"** – August 13, 2012: The "Freakshow" storyline introduces the Jägerbar and sets the stage for Nick's heightened abilities.
- **"The Russian Rose"** – September 28, 2012: A fan-favorite featuring the return of Monroe's ex-fiancée.
- **"Octopus Head"** – October 26, 2012: The Halloween episode introducing the Seltenvogel.
- **"Season of the Hexenbiest"** – January 29, 2013: A pivotal midseason episode about Adalind's transformation.
- **"Quill"** – March 5, 2013: The spread of a deadly contagion created by the Verrat.
- **"The End"** – May 21, 2013: A stunning season finale that kills off a main character and leaves Nick's fate in jeopardy.

The air dates for Season 2 reflect a shift to Tuesday nights, where the show found a consistent audience. The finale's cliffhanger—Nick's mother returning to avenge his father's death—was a major watercooler moment.

Season 3 (2013–2014): The Road to Vienna

Premiering on **October 25, 2013** and concluding on **May 16, 2014**, Season 3 consisted of 22 episodes. This season expanded the mythology globally, taking Nick and the team to Europe and deepening the story of the keys.

Highlights:

- **"The Ungericht"** – October 25, 2013: A World War II era flashback introduces a historical storyline.
- **"PTZD"** – November 8, 2013: Nick faces the "Post Traumatic Zombie

The air dates show a steady Friday night slot, which became the show's home for the remainder of its run. While Friday is typically considered a low-viewership night, **Grimm** thrived there, building a loyal fanbase.

Season 4 (2014–2015): The Rise of Black Claw

Season 4 aired from **October 24, 2014** to **May 15, 2015**, again with 22 episodes. This season introduced the Black Claw organization and the more political side of the Wesen world.

Notable episodes:

- **"Thanks for the Memories"** – October 24, 2014: The first appearance of the "Memon" Wesen.
- **"Dyin' on the Mountain"** – November 21, 2014: A survival story on Mount Hood.
- **"The Grimm Who Stole Christmas"** – December 12, 2014: A holiday entry with a vengeful Krampus.
- **"Love Is in the Air"** – February 13, 2015: A Valentine's Day episode

featuring a Wesen pheromone.

- **"A Reptile Dysfunction"** – March 20, 2015: A fan favorite title with a self-deprecating tone.
- **"Iron Hans"** – April 10, 2015: The mythological origin of the "Iron Hans" legend.
- **"Cry Luison"** – May 15, 2015: The season finale with the shocking death of Juliette.

The season marked a tonal shift toward serialized storytelling. The air dates reflect a consistent Friday schedule, and the finale's death of a major character was a polarizing but bold choice.

Season 5 (2015–2016): Rebuilding After Loss

Season 5 premiered on **October 30, 2015** and concluded on **May 20, 2016**, with another 22 episodes. Following Juliette's death, Nick is left emotionally shattered, and the season explores his journey toward healing while battling the Black Claw conspiracy.

Key episodes:

- **"The Grimm Identity"** – October 30, 2015: Nick seeks a new purpose after loss.
- **"Clear and Wesen Danger"** – November 6, 2015: A murder mystery involving a radio host.
- **"Show Me a Hero"** – February 12, 2016: The midseason premiere sets up a major conflict.
- **"The Taming of the Wu"** – March 25, 2016: Wu becomes a Grimm, a major character moment.
- **"The Son Also Rises"** – May 20, 2016: A cliffhanger finale with Diana and the Black Claw infiltration.

Season 5 is often seen as a transitional

year, with the writers testing new directions. The air dates show a late October start and a May finale, typical of network television.
