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difficult to shape. The ideal bead is glossy and slightly domed. Practice making beads on a piece of foil before applying to your nails.

Step 4: Apply the Acrylic

Place the bead at the base of your nail near the cuticle, but not touching the skin. Using gentle pressure, push the acrylic toward the cuticle area, then use the brush to feather it out over the rest of the nail plate and tip. You want a thin, even layer. Repeat for each nail, working one nail at a time. The acrylic will start to harden within 30 to 60 seconds, so you need to move efficiently. Yellowing can happen for several reasons: using low-quality products, smoking, or exposure to certain chemicals. Using a high-quality monomer and powder will reduce the risk. Also, always apply a top coat with UV protection to prevent yellowing from sunlight.
