In 1965, Barnes suffered a severe injury to his hand during a game. The injury required surgery and ultimately ended his professional football career. He moved to Los Angeles with a portfolio of his work, ready to break into the art world.

It is a perfect example of what he achieved: taking a personal memory and turning it into a universal symbol

of celebration.

The Style of Ernie Barnes: Grace Under Pressure

Barnes's artistic style is immediately recognizable. His figures are tall, graceful, and dynamic, with elongated limbs and expressive faces.
