However, the continuously variable transmission (CVT) that Nissan pairs with this engine has been a point of contention. While it helps with fuel economy—the Maxima achieves an EPA-rated 20 mpg city and 30 mpg highway—Consumer Reports testers note that the CVT can feel rubbery or drone under hard acceleration, dulling the sporty experience that the engine promises. Some model years, particularly around 2016-2019, have also seen more frequent transmission complaints in Consumer Reports owner surveys.

Handling and Ride Comfort

The Maxima is tuned to be sportier than average for its class. Consumer Reports test drivers find the steering to be well-weighted and responsive, and the chassis provides good grip during cornering. The trade-off, however, is a firm ride. While many buyers appreciate the sporty feel, those seeking a plush, cushioned ride might find the Maxima too harsh over rough pavement. The suspension does a reasonable job of absorbing larger bumps, but smaller imperfections can be transmitted into the cabin. This characteristic is less forgiving than the Avalon’s cloud-like ride, but more engaging than the average sedan.

Fuel Economy and Real-World MPG

According to Consumer Reports’ real-world testing, the Maxima’s fuel economy usually falls slightly below its EPA estimates, especially in mixed driving. Owners report an average of around 22-24 mpg in combined driving, which is competitive for a V6 sedan but not class-leading. The front-wheel-drive layout and the CVT help keep fuel consumption reasonable, but if maximum efficiency is your priority, a hybrid or four-cylinder rival may be a better choice.

Interior Quality and Comfort

Cabin Materials and Design

Step inside a Maxima, and you’ll find an interior that aims for a near-luxury feel. Consumer Reports notes that higher trim levels feature premium materials like soft-touch surfaces, real aluminum trim, and available semi-aniline leather. The “Zero Gravity” front seats, inspired by NASA technology, earn high marks for long-distance comfort and support. The back seat is spacious enough for two adults, but three across can be cramped due to a prominent transmission tunnel and limited shoulder room. Headroom and legroom are adequate, though the sloping roofline slightly reduces rear headroom for taller passengers.

Infotainment and Technology

The infotainment system in the Maxima has evolved over the years. Consumer Reports highlights that newer models (2020 and later) feature a responsive 8-inch touchscreen with Apple CarPlay and Android Auto integration. However, earlier iterations (2016–2019) suffered from slow response times and a cluttered menu interface. The optional Bose premium audio system receives praise for its clarity, and the available dual-panel panoramic moonroof adds an airy feel to the cabin. On the downside, the climate controls are partially integrated into the touchscreen, which some testers find distracting while driving.

Safety and Driver Assistance Features

Crash Test Ratings

The Nissan Maxima has performed well in official crash tests. The Insurance Institute for Highway Safety (IIHS) gave the 2024 model Top Safety Pick+ ratings, and the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) awarded five stars overall. Consumer Reports incorporates these results into its safety score, and the Maxima generally earns a strong rating in crashworthiness. Standard Safety Suite

For those prioritizing advanced driver aids, the Maxima offers a solid package, though it lacks some of the more sophisticated lane-centering technology found in competitors like the Honda Accord or Hyundai Sonata.

Reliability and Common Problems According to Consumer Reports

Predicted Reliability Ratings

Consumer Reports’ predicted reliability rating for the Nissan Maxima has varied significantly by model year. The early seventh-generation models (2016–2018) received below-average reliability scores, with frequent complaints about the CVT transmission, air conditioning failures, and infotainment glitches. The most recent 2021–2024 models have earned average to slightly above-average ratings, as Nissan addressed some of the earlier quality issues.
