Question: Describe how you used the “Respect Wildlife” principle on a campout.

Sample answer: During a three-day hike in Shenandoah National Park, we encountered a deer near our campsite. Instead of approaching or feeding it, we stored all food in bear canisters and kept our cooking area separate from sleeping areas. We also kept a clean camp—no crumbs left behind. By observing wildlife from a safe distance, we avoided altering their behavior and kept both ourselves and the animals safe.

Preparing for the Merit Badge Counselor Meeting
