- **Consolidation of the Market:** The cycling industry saw massive consolidation. Big players like Trek and Specialized began to offer entry-level bikes that were increasingly competitive in price and quality.
- **The Co-op Cycles Rebrand:** REI decided to rebrand its entire cycling lineup under the "Co-op Cycles" name. This unified the brand identity. The Co-op Cycles DRT (mountain), ADV (gravel/adventure), and CTY (city) lines were created to replace Novara. This allowed REI to modernize the branding and cater to specific niches like gravel riding and plus-size mountain biking.

The transition was bittersweet for long-time fans. The name "Novara" carried a sense of ruggedness and old-school reliability that the more modern "Co-op Cycles" branding didn't immediately capture. However, the goal was the same: provide excellent value to REI members with the backing of the co-op's return policy.

The Enduring Appeal of Novara Bikes in the Used Market
