Engine Displacement and Power

The tilling width typically ranges from 10 inches to 16 inches on front tine models. Wider tines cover more ground faster, but narrower tines are better for tight spaces and between rows of established plants. Adjustable tine widths are available on some premium models, allowing you to narrow the path for cultivating and widen it for initial soil preparation.

Weight and Maneuverability

Front tine tillers are generally lighter than rear tine models, usually weighing between 60 and 120 pounds. This makes them easier to transport in the back of a pickup truck or SUV and easier to maneuver in tight garden corners. However, lighter weight means you may need to push down or make multiple passes in very hard soil. Look for models with large, pneumatic tires for better traction and balance.

Adjustable Depth Stake

Most front tine tillers include a depth stake (sometimes called a drag stake) at the front or rear of the machine. This adjustable metal bar controls how deep the tines dig into the soil. Setting it lower allows for deeper tilling, while raising it is useful for shallow cultivation or weeding. This feature is critical for versatility, as you will need different depths for seeding versus mixing in compost.

- Let the Machine Do the Work:** One of the most common mistakes is trying to force the tiller forward. The spinning tines naturally pull the machine forward. Simply guide the handles and let the tiller dig. If you encounter resistance, lift slightly on the handles to let the tines grab the soil.
- Make Multiple Passes:** For deep tilling (6-8 inches), it is better to make two or three passes over the same area, each time going a little deeper. This reduces strain on the engine and produces a more uniform soil texture.
- Allow the Soil to Rest:** After tilling, give the soil a day or two to settle before planting. This allows the organic matter to begin integrating and lets the soil structure stabilize.

Oil Changes

Air Filter Cleaning

Garden tillers work in dusty environments. The air filter should be inspected before each use. A clogged air filter restricts airflow to the engine, reducing power and efficiency. Most filters are foam or paper; foam filters can be washed with soap and water, while paper filters should be replaced.

Spark Plug Inspection

A fouled or worn spark plug can cause hard starting and rough running. Remove the spark plug annually, check the gap with a feeler gauge, and replace it if the electrode is worn or covered in carbon deposits. Tractor Supply stocks compatible spark plugs for almost all small engines.

Tine Sharpening and Replacement

Over time, the tines will become dull or bent, especially if you hit rocks or roots. Dull tines make the tiller work harder and produce a rougher soil texture. Fuel Management

Ethanol-blended gasoline can attract moisture and cause engine problems over time. At the end of the gardening season, either drain the fuel tank or run the tiller until it runs out of gas to prevent carburetor issues.
