Practice this until your fingers move smoothly between the strings. This single-note line is the skeleton upon which we will build the chords.

Adding Harmony: The Primary Chords for Lyre

Repeat the exact same pattern as Section 3. Strum G, pluck the descending line, and strum G again on "sky." This repetition is a hallmark of the song and makes learning **Twinkle Twinkle Little Star chords lyre** very efficient.

Return to the C major chord for the final repetition of "Twinkle, twinkle, little star" and the F to C resolution for "How I wonder what you are." The final note should ring out on a C chord.
