These sites are particularly useful because they let you filter by channel numbers, which is helpful if you have a custom lineup from Xfinity or another local provider.

Built-In DVR and Cable Box Interfaces

If you have cable or satellite, your DVR (Digital Video Recorder) is the most direct way to see listings. Xfinity's X1 platform, for instance, uses a voice-activated remote and a smart grid that scrolls two weeks into the future. You can search for shows by name, actor, or keyword. Similarly, **Dish Network** and **DirecTV** have their own intuitive guides. - **KPTV (Fox 12)** – The Fox affiliate. Known for "Fox 12 News," sports coverage (including NFL and some college games), and prime-time shows like "The Simpsons" and "9-1-1."
- **KRCW (CW 32)** – The CW affiliate. Features programming for younger audiences, including "Riverdale," "All American," and the "Supernatural" universe.

Public and Educational Broadcasting

- **OPB (Oregon Public Broadcasting) - Channel 10** – A crucial resource for the region. OPB is a PBS member station that provides national programming like "Masterpiece," "NOVA," and "Antiques Roadshow," along with exceptional local content such as "Oregon Art Beat," "Oregon Field Guide," and comprehensive news coverage from the OPB newsroom. It also runs multiple subchannels: OPB (main), OPB Plus (secondary), OPB Kids, and OPB World.
- **KMHD (Jazz) - Subchannel of OPB** – Dedicated to jazz programming, syndicated from local radio and national sources. A gem for music lovers.

Independent and Specialty Channels

Thanks to digital broadcasting, many stations offer subchannels with classic content. For example, **KPDX (MyTV 49)** often airs older series and movies. Other subchannels you will see in Portland listings include:

- **MeTV** – Classic TV like "I Love Lucy," "M*A*S*H," and "The Brady Bunch."
- **Court TV** – Live courtroom coverage.
- **Ion Television** – Procedural dramas and movies.
- **Grit** – Western and action films.
- **Bounce TV** – African American-focused entertainment.
- **Laff** – Comedy sitcoms and stand-up.

Knowing these subchannels is key to maximizing your TV guide, especially if you use an antenna.

Streaming vs. Traditional TV: How Listings Adapt
