4. About 20 minutes before baking, preheat your oven to 450°F (230°C) with a baking stone or inverted baking sheet placed on the middle rack. Place a metal pan (like a broiler pan) on the lower rack to create steam.

Slashing and Baking

1. Just before baking, dust the loaf with a little flour. Use a sharp serrated knife or lame to slash the top in a crosshatch pattern. This allows the bread to expand in the oven.
2. Slide the loaf (still on the parchment) onto the preheated baking stone. Pour 1 cup of hot water into the steam pan below and quickly close the oven door.
3. Bake for about 25 to 30 minutes, until the crust is deep golden brown and the internal temperature reaches at least 200°F (93°C). For a crisper crust, leave the loaf in the oven with the door cracked for 5 minutes after turning off the heat.
4. Cool on a wire rack for at least 20 minutes before slicing. Cutting too early will make the crumb

gummy.

Variations for a Healthier Loaf
