Topics ranged from daily life situations, such as ordering food or asking for directions, to more academic discussions.

Grammar and Vocabulary Section

This section tested your knowledge of essential Japanese grammar points and vocabulary. You could expect questions about particles, verb conjugations, adjective forms, honorific language (keigo), and sentence connectors. The vocabulary tested was typically drawn from everyday usage, including words related to school, home, travel, and social interactions.

Many students find this section the most straightforward to improve because it relies heavily on memorization and pattern recognition. However, the test also required you to apply grammar rules in context, so rote memorization alone was not enough.

Reading Comprehension Section

The reading portion assessed your ability to understand written Japanese in various formats, including short passages, advertisements, notices, letters, and even simple literary excerpts. You were expected to infer meaning, identify the main idea, and answer questions about details. The passages often incorporated both kanji and kana, and a strong grasp of kanji characters at the N4 to N3 level (on the JLPT scale) was generally sufficient.

Reading comprehension is where many heritage speakers or students who have spent time in Japan tend to shine, but even learners who have only studied in a classroom can perform well with targeted practice.

Building Your Study Plan

Assess Your Current Level
