

How To Knit A Flower Easy

Understanding the Basic Stitches You Will Use

If you can knit, purl, and yarn over, you already know everything you need to make a simple flower. For those who are still building confidence, here is a quick refresher on the stitches that appear in most easy flower patterns.

The Knit Stitch

The knit stitch is the foundation of almost every knitting project. It creates a smooth V-shaped pattern on the front side of your work. When you knit every row, you produce garter stitch, which is flat and gives a nice texture for petals.

The Purl Stitch

The purl stitch is the reverse of the knit stitch. It creates a bumpy texture on the side facing you. Combining knit and purl stitches allows you to create ribbing or textured patterns that add depth to your flower petals.

Yarn Over (YO)

A yarn over is a simple increase that creates a small hole in your knitting. This is often used in flower patterns to add width to the petals and give them a delicate, lacy appearance. To do a yarn over, simply bring the yarn to the front of your work (if it is not already there) and then knit the next stitch as usual. The extra loop creates an increase and that signature eyelet look.

Binding Off (Casting Off)

Binding off secures your stitches so your work does not unravel. For a flower, you will often bind off loosely so the edge of the petal remains flexible and can be shaped easily.

Once you feel comfortable with these stitches, you are ready to move on to the actual project. The question of how to knit a flower easy enough for a beginner becomes much simpler when you break it down step by step.

Step by Step Guide: How to Knit a Flower Easy Enough for Anyone

This pattern creates a simple five petal flower using basic knit stitches and yarn overs. It is worked flat and then seamed together at the end. You can make the flower larger by casting on more stitches or using thicker yarn, and smaller by using fewer stitches and finer yarn.

Step 1: Cast On

Using your chosen yarn and needles, cast on 60 stitches loosely. If you prefer a smaller flower, cast on 40 stitches. The total number should be a multiple of 12 for the petal structure to work evenly. For this tutorial, we will use 60 stitches, which gives you five petals with 12 stitches each.

Step 2: Knit the First Row

Knit across all 60 stitches. This forms the base row of your flower.

Step 3: Create the Petal Increases

Row 2: Knit 1, yarn over, knit 1, yarn over, knit 1. Repeat this pattern across the entire row. You are essentially adding increases that will widen the petals. At the end of this row, you will have 100 stitches.

Step 4: Knit the Body Rows

Row 3: Knit all stitches across. Row 4: Knit all stitches across. Row 5: Knit all stitches across.

These three rows of plain knitting allow the increases to settle into gentle curves that form the petals.

Step 5: Bind Off Loosely

Bind off all stitches loosely. Do not pull the yarn tight. A loose bind off gives the petals a soft, flowing edge rather than a stiff line. Cut the yarn, leaving a long tail of at least 12 inches for sewing.

Step 6: Form the Flower

Thread the tail onto your tapestry needle. Begin at one end of your knitted strip and gently gather the bound off edge by running the needle through each stitch along that edge. Pull the yarn to gather the fabric into a rosette shape. As you pull, the increases will naturally create the look of petals folding outward. Once the flower is gathered to your liking, secure the shape by stitching through the base several times.

Step 7: Add a Center (Optional but Lovely)

To finish your flower, you can add a center button, a French knot, or a small knitted circle. A simple button in a contrasting color gives the flower a polished look and hides the gathering stitches. If you prefer a yarn center, cut a small piece of yarn, tie a knot in the middle, and sew it into the center of the flower.

Variations to Make Your Knitted Flowers Unique

Change the Yarn Weight

Adjust the Number of Petals

By changing the number of stitches you cast on, you can create flowers with four, six, or even eight petals. For a four petal flower, cast on 48 stitches of your chosen yarn. For six petals, cast on 72 stitches. The principle remains exactly the same, and you are simply repeating the same pattern over more or fewer sections.

Add a Second Color

For a two tone flower, change yarn colors after the increase row. Knit the body rows in a contrasting color. This gives the petals a darker or lighter center edge. You can also knit the entire flower in a variegated or self-striping yarn for a completely different look without any extra work.

Make a Flower with Pointed Petals

If you prefer a more defined petal shape, add a few short rows or decrease stitches at the tip of each petal during the body rows. This is a slightly more advanced technique, but it dramatically changes the appearance of your flower.

Tips for Beginners Knitting Their First Flower

- **Do not pull the bind off too tight.** A tight edge will cause the flower to curl in on itself rather than opening into a bloom. Keep your tension relaxed.
- **Block your flower.** If the petals look a bit uneven, gently wet the flower, shape it, and let it dry flat. Blocking helps the stitches relax into a more uniform shape.
- **Practice on a swatch first.** If you are unsure about the yarn overs, knit a small test swatch with the increase pattern to build confidence before starting the actual flower.

Jewelry

Make very small flowers with fine yarn and attach them to earring hooks or necklace chains. A matching set of flower earrings is a lovely project for advanced beginners who want to try working with smaller needles.

Sew a flower onto the corner of a baby blanket, the front of a sweater, or the top of a hat. This is an excellent way to use up small amounts of leftover yarn while adding charm to your larger projects.
