Learning the Pink Panther Theme: A Step-by-Step Approach

Step 1: Master the Syncopated Rhythm

The hallmark of this theme is its “lazy” syncopation. The opening notes are not played exactly on the beat—they anticipate it. Start by clapping the rhythm without the piano.
