2. The Power of Pencil Marks (Candidate Notation)

If you are tackling a hard or expert Pogo Daily Sudoku, you cannot solve it solely with Naked and Hidden Singles. You must use pencil marks. This involves listing all possible numbers that could go into each empty cell. To do this, look at the row, column, and box for each cell and eliminate any numbers you see. The remaining numbers are the candidates.

For example, if a cell is in a row that has a 1 and a 2, a column that has a 3 and a 4, and a box that has a 5 and a 6, the possible candidates for that cell are 7, 8, and 9. Once you have these marks down, patterns begin to emerge. Pogo provides an excellent note-taking interface for this, and using it effectively is the single biggest leap you can make in improving your game. solve everything in their head.

3. Locked Candidates and Pointing Pairs

This is a powerful intermediate strategy that relies on your pencil marks. A **Locked Candidate** occurs when a number is restricted to a single row or column within a specific box. For instance, imagine that within a 3x3 box, the number "7" can only appear in cells that are all in the top row of that box. This means that "7" cannot appear anywhere else along that row outside of that box. You can therefore eliminate "7" as a candidate from the rest of that row in the other boxes.

Similarly, a **Pointing Pair** works in reverse. If a number is restricted to a single column in a box, you can eliminate it from the rest of that column. These techniques are essential for reducing the number of candidates in your grid and paving the way for more advanced deductions. They are frequently the "key" that unlocks a difficult Pogo puzzle.

4. Naked Pairs, Triples, and Quads

This is where the logic becomes more abstract. A **Naked Pair** occurs when two cells within the same row, column, or box contain exactly the same two candidate numbers, and no other candidates. Even if you don't know which of the two numbers goes in which cell, you know that those two numbers are consumed by those two cells. Therefore, you can safely eliminate those two

candidate numbers from all other cells in that same row, column, or box.

The same logic applies to **Naked Triples** (three cells containing the same three candidates) and **Naked Quads** (four cells with the same four candidates). These are harder to spot but incredibly effective. They are often the bottleneck for players who are stuck on a medium or hard daily puzzle. Observing these patterns in a solution guide can be an "aha!" moment that dramatically improves your pattern recognition for future games.

5. The X-Wing and Swordfish

These are advanced techniques that involve looking for patterns across multiple rows and columns. An **X-Wing** occurs when a number appears as a candidate in exactly two cells in two different rows, and those cells align vertically in the same two columns. This creates a rectangular pattern. The logic dictates that the number must be the solution in one of the two pairs, so it can be eliminated from other cells in those two columns.

A **Swordfish** is an extension of the X-Wing to three rows and three columns. Mastering these techniques is what separates an intermediate solver from an expert. Why You Get Stuck and How to Unstick Yourself
