- **Périgueux and Sarlat-la-Canéda:** These are the two stars of the Dordogne. Périgueux is the prefecture, known for its cathedral and Roman ruins. Sarlat is a perfectly preserved medieval town that

feels frozen in time. A map of the Dordogne river valley is essential for navigating the labyrinth of tiny villages, castles, and market towns between them.

- **Albi and Carcassonne:** Further east in Occitanie, Albi boasts the world's largest brick cathedral, a fortress of faith. Carcassonne is the quintessential medieval fortified city, a UNESCO World Heritage site that looks like it belongs in a fairy tale. Near Toulouse, the **cassoulet** is a slow-cooked bean stew that is the pride of the city.
