Step-by-Step: How To Cook Roast Beef In Oven

Step 1: Prepare the Roast

Remove the roast from the refrigerator at least 45 minutes to 1 hour before cooking. Allowing it to come to room temperature ensures more even cooking throughout. A cold roast straight from the fridge will cook unevenly, with the outside drying out before the center is done.

Pat the roast dry with paper towels. Moisture on the surface will steam rather than sear, preventing that desirable brown crust. If your roast has a thick fat cap, score it lightly in a crosshatch pattern to help render the fat and season it deeply.

Step 2: Season Generously

Seasoning is simple but crucial. Rub the roast all over with olive oil or softened butter. Then apply a generous coating of kosher salt and freshly cracked black pepper. The salt not only flavors the meat but also helps draw moisture to the surface, which then evaporates and deepens the crust. For added flavor, you can incorporate garlic powder, dried rosemary, thyme, or Dijon mustard into the rub. Do not be shy with the salt—most of it will stay on the surface.

Step 3: Sear the Roast (Optional but Recommended)

While not strictly required, searing the roast in a hot skillet before oven roasting adds tremendous flavor. Heat a tablespoon of high-smoke-point oil like avocado or canola in a heavy skillet over medium-high heat. Sear each side of the roast for 2 to 3 minutes until deeply browned. This step builds a flavorful crust that enhances every bite. If you are short on time or prefer a simpler method, you can skip searing and rely on the oven's high heat at the beginning to achieve browning.

Step 4: Preheat the Oven and Set the Temperature

Preheat your oven to 450°F (230°C) for the initial high-heat sear. This blast of heat will help form a beautiful crust. After 15 minutes, you will reduce the temperature to 325°F (160°C) for the remainder of the cooking. This two-temperature method is one of the most effective ways to answer **how to cook roast beef in oven** with a perfect crust and a

tender interior.

Step 5: Roast to the Desired Internal Temperature

Place the roast on a rack in a roasting pan, fat side up if applicable. Insert a probe thermometer into the thickest part of the meat, avoiding any bones or large pockets of fat. Place the roast in the preheated 450°F oven for 15 minutes. Then, without opening the oven door, reduce the temperature to 325°F and continue roasting until the thermometer reaches your target temperature.

Target Internal Temperatures (after resting):

- **Rare:** 120°F to 125°F (49°C to 52°C) - Remove from oven at about 115°F to 120°F
- **Medium-Rare:** 130°F to 135°F (54°C to 57°C) - Remove from oven at about 125°F to 130°F
- **Medium:** 140°F to 145°F (60°C to 63°C) - Remove from oven at about 135°F to 140°F
- **Medium-Well:** 150°F to 155°F (65°C to 68°C) - Remove from oven at about 145°F to 150°F
- **Well-Done:** 160°F+ (71°C+) - Remove from oven at about 155°F

Remember that the meat will continue to cook and rise in temperature by about 5°F to 10°F while it rests. This is called carryover cooking. Always remove the roast from the oven when it is 5°F to 10°F below your target doneness.

Step 6: Rest the Roast

This is the most important step in **how to cook roast beef in oven**. Resting allows the juices, which have been pushed to the center during cooking, to redistribute evenly throughout the meat. If you cut into the roast immediately, those juices will run out onto the cutting board, leaving you with dry beef.

Transfer the roast to a cutting board, tent it loosely with aluminum foil, and let it rest for at least 15 to 20 minutes for a small roast, or up to 30 minutes for a larger one. Do not wrap it tightly, or the crust will soften.

Step 7: Carve and Serve

Use a sharp carving knife to slice the roast against the grain. Slicing against the grain shortens the muscle fibers, making each bite more tender. Consider Dry Brining

For even deeper flavor, dry brine the roast overnight. Simply season it generously with salt and leave it uncovered on a rack in the refrigerator for 12 to 24 hours. The salt penetrates the meat, seasoning it from within, while the surface dries out, ensuring a superior crust.

Cook by Temperature, Not Time

Cooking times are estimates at best. Ovens vary, roasts vary, and starting temperatures vary. Always rely on a meat thermometer to determine doneness. A general guideline is about 15 minutes per pound at 325°F after the initial sear, but always verify with the thermometer.

Making Gravy from Pan Drippings
