Step-by-Step Guide to Solving Red Dead Redemption Treasure Map 3

Step 3: Claim Your Reward

After digging, you retrieve the contents automatically. **Red Dead Redemption Treasure Map 3** yields two gold bars, which can be sold at any general store or to the doctor in Armadillo. At around \$500 each, that is a tidy profit for a few minutes of exploration. Additionally, you will obtain Treasure Map 4, which leads to the final and most valuable cache in the series.

Tips for Successful Treasure Hunting in Red Dead Redemption

To make the most of your time with **Red Dead Redemption Treasure Map 3** and the other maps, keep these strategies in mind:

- **Use the journal effectively:** Your in-game journal records each map and any notes you have made. Reviewing it can help you

recall landmarks.

- **Ride, don't fast travel:** The joy of treasure hunting is in the journey. Fast travel skips the beautiful scenery and random encounters that make the world feel alive.
- **Mark your map:** If you think you have identified the area, place a custom waypoint. Then approach on foot for the final search.
- **Patience with Eagle Eye:** Eagle Eye (clicking the right stick) highlights interactive items. Use it frequently when you are near a suspected dig site.
- **Save before digging:** In rare cases, the treasure might glitch or you might accidentally miss the prompt. A quick save ensures you do not lose your progress.
