2. Pez X-Ray (Pez X-Ray)

The **pez x-ray** (scientific name *Pristella maxillaris*) is a small freshwater fish native to South American river basins. Its Spanish common name derives from its translucent body, which allows you to see its internal skeleton and organs—like an X-ray image. Also known as the x-ray tetra or goldfinch tetra, it is a popular aquarium fish due to its peaceful nature and striking appearance. The body is silvery-gold with black-and-white striped dorsal and anal fins. Pez x-rays thrive in soft, acidic water and typically school in groups of six or more. 4. Xerus (Ardilla de Tierra Xerus)

The **xerus** is a genus of African ground squirrels. In Spanish, they are sometimes called *ardilla de tierra xerus* or simply *xerus*. There are four species—Cape ground squirrel, mountain ground squirrel, South African ground squirrel, and unstriped ground squirrel. They inhabit savannas, grasslands, and arid regions of southern Africa. Xerus have short, coarse fur, a long bushy tail, and strong claws for digging burrows. They are social animals living in colonies of up to 30 individuals. Their diet consists of seeds, bulbs, insects, and small vertebrates. Unlike tree squirrels, xerus spend most of their time on the ground and use elaborate warning calls to alert others of predators like snakes and raptors.
