For example, many purple strains like Purple Urkle will develop deep magenta or dark burgundy pistils. However, pistil color is heavily influenced by environment and harvest timing, so it is a secondary clue rather than a definitive identifier. What is more important is the density of the pistils. Some strains are notably "hairy," with a thick carpet of pistils covering the entire bud, while others are more sparse.

The initial sniff of the whole bud gives you the top notes, but the finger test reveals the deeper, more nuanced undertones.
