How to Make a Safe and Effective Salt Solution for Nose Piercing

If you decide to prepare your own aftercare solution, follow these steps carefully. Using the correct ratio is essential. A solution that is too strong will irritate and dry out your piercing, while a solution that is too weak will not be effective for cleaning and soothing.

What You Will Need

- 1/4 teaspoon of non-iodized sea salt or kosher salt. Do not use table salt, which contains iodine and anti-caking agents that can cause irritation.
- 1 cup (8 ounces) of distilled or bottled water. Tap water may contain chlorine, fluoride, or bacteria that can harm a healing

- piercing.
- A clean glass jar or a ceramic bowl.
- A clean spoon for stirring.
- Optional: A microwave-safe container if you wish to warm the water.

This recipe yields a 0.9% saline solution, which matches the isotonic concentration found in many commercial products. Do not double the salt thinking it will clean better. More salt does not equal better results; it equals more irritation.

Tea tree oil is sometimes suggested for piercing aftercare, but it is far too strong for a fresh wound and can cause chemical burns. Avoid using any essential oils, alcohol, hydrogen peroxide, or antibiotic ointments on your healing piercing. These products kill bacteria, but they also destroy healthy cells and delay healing.
