- The Risen Heel:** The performer then simply rises onto the ball of the front foot. This creates the illusion that the entire body has levitated a few inches. The hidden, lifted foot remains behind the standing leg, completely invisible to the spectator.

This explains why Blaine often performs the trick while wearing loose-fitting pants or jeans. The fabric of the pants drapes over the lifted foot, helping to conceal its position. It also explains why the levitation is usually only a few inches off the ground and lasts only a few seconds—the performer is essentially balancing on one foot while creating the illusion of floating.

Why It Works: The Psychology of the Street

The genius of David Blaine is not just in knowing the mechanics of **How Does David Blaine Levitate**, but in understanding the psychology of the performance space. On a street corner, there is no stage, no proscenium arch, and no separation between performer and spectator. This creates a unique set of challenges and opportunities.

While the Balducci levitation explains the classic "street" version of the trick, Blaine has also performed a more dramatic levitation in his specials, most notably in *David Blaine: Real or Magic*. In this routine, he appears to ascend several feet into the air, hovering a meter or more above the ground. This version cannot be explained by the Balducci method alone.

For these larger, more theatrical levitations, the methods change. It is widely believed that these are performed using one of two advanced techniques:

1. The Invisible Thread Method

This technique uses a very thin, nearly invisible thread (often made of carbon fiber or Kevlar) that is attached to the performer's clothing and then run through a pulley system held by a concealed assistant or attached to a building. The thread is then pulled upward, causing the performer to rise. However, this method is risky in a street environment where wind or movement could expose the thread. 2. The Crane or Rigging Method
