Salutation

Opening Paragraph

Middle Paragraph

Step 4: Attach Your Resume Properly

Keep your file size reasonable. Most email servers have attachment limits of 10MB to 25MB. A standard resume PDF is usually under 1MB. If you are including a portfolio or additional documents, consider compressing them or providing a link to an online portfolio instead.

Step 5: Additional Documents and Links

In many cases, you may want to include more than just your resume. Here is how to handle common supplementary materials.

Cover Letter

You have two options for submitting a cover letter. You can either include it as a separate attachment or paste it into the body of your email. If you attach it, use a clear file name like "Jane_Doe_Cover_Letter.pdf." If you paste it into the email body, format it cleanly with short paragraphs and a professional tone. Some recruiters prefer the email body approach because it saves them from opening an additional file.

Portfolio or Work Samples
