6. **Final Activation:** Once registration is complete, your extender will reboot. After it comes back online, the "Service" LED should be solid. You are now ready to use your Verizon LTE Extender. Your phone will automatically connect to it when you are in range.

Optimizing Your Extender Placement

The location of your extender is critical for optimal performance. A poorly placed extender will limit its coverage area and effectiveness. This crucial piece of advice is often overlooked in a basic Verizon LTE extender user guide.
