7. **Manual Gear Linkage:** You need the shifter, cables, and the selector mechanism inside the transmission.
8. **ECU Reflash or Standalone Tune:** The engine control unit needs to be reprogrammed to remove CVT-specific logic (e.g., neutral safety switch, TCM communication) and to run the manual correctly. A **Mini Cooper CVT to manual** conversion is not possible without the correct engine management.
9. **Transmission Mounts:** Manual mini uses different

mount positions.

Inside the cabin, remove the driver's seat and the lower dashboard trim. Swap the pedal box for the manual version. Run the shift cables from the shifter through the firewall to the transmission.

6. Wiring and ECU Programming

You will need to bypass the CVT's neutral safety switch and reverse light switch. Some wires must be connected to the manual transmission's sensors. The ECU must be flashed with a manual transmission file. Many professional tuners offer this service specifically for Mini Cooper CVT to manual conversions.

7. Final Assembly
