Method 1: The Stovetop Skillet Technique (Best for Even Toasting)

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7. **Cool completely:** Let the seeds cool to room temperature before using or storing. They will become crisp as they cool.

Method 2: The Oven Toasting Method (Best for Large Batches)

If you need to toast a large quantity of sesame seeds, the oven is your best friend. This method is more hands-off and provides consistent results across a large surface area.

What You Will Need

- A baking sheet with a rim
- Parchment paper (optional, for easy cleanup)
- An oven

Step-by-Step Instructions

1. **Preheat your oven to 350°F (175°C).**

1. **Spread on a microwave-safe plate:** Arrange the seeds in a single, even layer on a microwave-safe plate.
2. **Microwave in short bursts:** Microwave on high for 30 seconds. Remove the plate and stir the seeds thoroughly.

Important note: The microwave method can easily result in uneven toasting, with some seeds burnt and others still raw. It is best used only when you have no other option.

- **Sound:** As the seeds toast, they may begin to pop or crackle slightly as moisture escapes. This is a sign that they are close to being done.
- **Mouthfeel:** A cooled, properly toasted seed will be crunchy and crisp. A raw seed will feel soft and chewy.

- **Do not use oil:** Dry toasting is essential. Oil will cause the seeds to fry rather than toast, changing the flavor and texture. It also makes it harder to control the process.
