Step 4: Making the Underbelly

Now switch to your second color. The underbelly is a flat piece that will attach to the shell. Using the same three-peg setup, create a chain of bands that is about six loops long. This will form the base of the turtle's body. Attach one end to the C-clip from the shell to connect the two pieces. The underbelly should be slightly smaller than the shell to give the turtle a natural shape.

Step 5: Adding the Head and Legs

For the head, create a small loop chain using the second color. Make it about four bands long. Attach this chain to the front of the underbelly. For the legs, make four identical chains, each about three bands long. Attach two on each side of the underbelly. The legs should be evenly spaced. For the tail, make one small chain of two bands and attach it to the back. Now your **Rainbow Loom Turtle Easy** is beginning to take shape.

Step 6: Assembling All Parts

Take the shell and carefully align it with the underbelly. Use the C-clip to secure the shell to the underbelly by hooking the remaining loops of the shell onto the edges of the underbelly. This step requires a gentle hand to avoid breaking bands. Once everything is connected, adjust the head, legs, and tail so they stick out naturally. Your turtle is now complete!
